

### **Pursuing 'RECONCILI-ACTION' Among Key Outcomes From Indigenous Awareness**

Township seeks to foster stronger relationship



Indigenous awareness training was recently hosted at the Township's Municipal Centre where members of Council and staff participated in a day-long session focused on learning the local history surrounding the Eastern Woodland here. Pictured above, Brian Charles helps trace time and history through 'Wampum' as members of Township staff join the presentation and earn a strong understanding of the Indigenous culture. Wampum were used to mark agreements between peoples.

Council hosted a special meeting on May 3, 2024 for Indigenous Aware Training with members of the Indigenous community offering a full day session for staff and council members. The session included messaging and values around family-life-community responsibilities, discovery and 'learning' of existing nations as well as grasping the beginnings, misunderstandings, improved understandings and the importance of decision-making.

The morning opened with a smudging ceremony and was followed by a journey through time thanks to a presentation from Brian Charles entitled Treaties through Wampum. His recitals focused on Indigenous History, Treaties and Aboriginal rights and Aboriginal-Crown relations.

focused on the history and legacy of residential schools, and reconciliation. At the end of the training session, Ms. Taylor, posed the question, "What could reconcili-ACTION look like?" This question will prove to serve as the inspiration for the Township's next steps.

Taylor's presentation highlighted examples of actions taken by several municipalities throughout Ontario to advance reconciliation. The actions highlighted in the presentation varied greatly amongst them but were generally a reflection of what reconciliation meant to each community. The various actions included the development of a land acknowledgement, a "Seven Feathers" cross walk representing the seven teachings, the development of formal relationships with Treaty First Nations, and events to honour the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation.



"What we do today is based on how it will impact the next generation," Charles explained. "The consideration and thoughts on decision makers through wampum focused on decisions that would serve and provide benefit for the next seven generations, not our own. That's a big responsibility and reminds us as leaders today that the decisions of today are more than just about today's issues as we need to learn that our decisions are for the next generation's benefit."

The afternoon presentation was led by Tiffany Taylor and was entitled the Historical Relationship with the Crown and Reconciliation and

The training session ultimately inspired several conversations between Staff, Council and the presenters regarding the potential actions that Adjala-Tosorontio could take to advance reconciliation and support the seven principles and teachings: love, courage, respect, truth, honesty, humility, and wisdom.

Staff are proposing that an ad hoc committee continue the conversation by exploring options for reconcili-Actions that represent what reconciliation means to the Township of Adjala-Tosorontio and how to prominently share these with the public.

On January 1st, 1994, the Township of Adjala-Tosorontio was established by the County of Simcoe Act, 1993. The Act amalgamated the former municipalities of the Township of Adjala, the Township of Tosorontio and a small portion the Township of Sunnidale.

Stretching over 371 square kilometers, approximately 11,000 residents call Adjala-Tosorontio home. With agricultural roots and a foundation as a safe, friendly, and peaceful place to live, Adjala-Tosorontio has a history to be proud of.

#### **Indigenous Roots**

The area that became the Township of Adjala-Tosorontio has been home to waves of settlement and migration by many Indigenous peoples. On October 17, 1818, the Lake Simcoe-Nottawasaga Treaty No. 18 was signed by representatives of the Crown and certain Anishinaabe peoples.


#### Township of Adjala

The Township of Adjala was incorporated in 1842, with majority of its early settlers coming from Ireland. A census conducted in 1842 identified 204 homes were located within Adjala, with an approximate population just under 900 residents.

Did you know the Township of Adjala was



named after the wife or daughter of Chief Tecumseth.



#### **Township of Tosorontio**

The Township of Tosorontio was incorporated in 1850. The first Council of the Township was comprised of a Reeve and four (4) Councillors. Grain, in particular, wheat played a prominent role in the early days of the Township, cementing the Township's roots in agriculture.

Did you know "Tosorontio" is a Huron word meaning "beautiful mountain".

#### **Township Crest**

As part of amalgamation in 1994, the Township of Adjala-Tosorontio created its official Township crest. The crest incorporates symbols which represent important aspects to Adjala-Tosorontio.

- The hands symbolic of unity, equality and peace;
- The beaver symbolic of industry;
- The wheat sheaves symbolic of our agriculture roots;
- The red maple leaf symbolic of our Canadian heritage;
- The gold veins symbolize prosperity; and
- The colour blue represents the clear waters of a pristine environment.

#### Establishing a Municipal Centre

In 2002, approximately 24 acres of land was purchased from the Modl Family, at an approximate cost of \$182,000, for the future site of the Township's Municipal Centre. On November 4, 2002, Domm Construction Ltd. was appointed the General Contractor for the project in conjunction with the Township's Building Committee, and construction began in late 2002. The approximate cost of construction was \$1.275 million dollars.

On October 20, 2003, the Council of the Township of Adjala-Tosorontio held its first Regular Council meeting at the newly built Municipal Centre, and would celebrate the Grand Opening on October 26, 2003, with a ribbon cutting ceremony.

In December of 2003, Alan and Brenda Lundy donated approximately 1.7 acres as additional lands, to the property already owned by the Township.

Today, the Municipal Centre is home to a 1.35 km walking track, gazebo, three (3) soccer fields, and Warden's Park.





#### **Our Future**

As a Township, we have so much to look forward to. In 2024, the Township will complete its Strategic Plan, which will guide decisions and actions about the future of Adjala-Tosorontio.

As we think about the future, we recognize the path forward is one to be taken collectively.

# **Traditional Push-in ceremony for new Tanker**



The ATFD recently acquired a 3200 US Gallon Tanker from Dependable Emergency Vehicles and in honor of the new addition to their fleet, the entire Adj-Tos Fire Department gathered Tuesday June 4th to assist in a traditional "push in" ceremony. As pictured above, the ceremony took place at Station 2 in Loretto with firefighters rolling up their sleeves and pushing the tanker home. Fire Chief Matt Poliziani reflected on this time -honored tradition within the fire service. "Celebrating the arrival of a new unit has been a source of pride for fire departments across North America for over a century, he noted. "In recent years, the push-in ceremony has gained popularity, particularly in smaller communities." The history of the ceremony dates to the 17th Century where early hand-drawn fire engines, ladder wagons, hose carts, and other apparatus had to be pushed back into the station by hand after every call. The horse-drawn steam engines that followed in the 18th century could be backed up. However, having to control the horses made it difficult to align the engine's steam connections with the station's steam connections. For this reason, the horses were typically disconnected and the engine was again pushed back into the station by hand.

In recent days the crews have been applying calcium to our gravel roads as a dust suppressant. #### **Updated Water Rate Study Complete**

The Township retained Watson and Associates to prepare a rate study of the Water and Wastewater system based on the future operational and capital needs as well as forecasting future growth. The Rate Study was completed on March 13, 2024. The recommendations made by Watson and Associates resulted in an increase to the current water and wastewater rates as well as introducing a new sewer consumption rate.

At the April 10, 2024 Regular Council Meeting, Council adopted new Water and Wastewater rates. The new rates will take effect on **July 1**, **2024** and will be applied to the third quarter billings going forward.

#### Welcome New Residents

Check out the items below to learn about the support and services that are available for your property tax and utility billing.

#### The billing cycle for two Property tax bills is:

**1.** Interim Tax Bills Notice: Interim tax bills are due on the last business day in March and May. Interim taxes are calculated based on 50% of the previous year's total taxes.

**2. Final Tax Bills Notice:** Final tax bills are due on the last business day of July and September. (Please note Commercial & Industrial property taxes are due in August & October). Final taxes are calculated using the assessed property value and approved tax rates, less the Interim tax billing.

Please be aware that your tax bill will show separate Special Charges for OPP 1 unit (Policing) for a total annual charge of \$375.00 or \$187.50 for vacant lands.

When you purchase a newly built home, a property assessment process takes place. The Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC) will assess the value of your home and send the information to the Township for property tax billing purposes. This process can take up to three years to complete and will result in a supplemental tax billing from date of occupancy.
